Moose Jaw Forklift License - Obtaining a forklift certification or forklift license in North America will require the trainee to carry out hands-on training in addition to classroom instruction. The provincial, federal and state regulatory bodies are responsible for the certification, training and licensing for powered industrial truck operators. Operators may acquire a license either by a third party or through training administered by the employer. Regardless, regulatory requirements need to be met. Recertification is needed every two to three years.

The lift truck is a powered industrial machine which is designed together with many alternatives, like stand-up and sit down models, electric and propane versions, and various sizes and types to meet the industrial requirements of workers. Operator training programs are usually individualized to address the specific kinds and uses for which the operator is training. Training on a sit-down, gas-powered lift truck within a warehouse setting would not be the same as training on a propane-powered, stand-up lift truck within a shipyard. The various lift trucks and their uses makes it impossible to establish universal licensing requirements for all industries and machines. Regulatory standards, therefore, have a tendency not to concentrate on particular course requirements but rather on the outcome of individual training programs.

On the job training that is offered by the employer is the most common method of forklift training licensing and certification. The employer who provides this method of certification is required to offer classroom sessions and practical training on equipment at their place of work. Employers may opt to train workers on each type of forklift separately, or to train them on all machines combined. The program incorporates forklift operation procedures, safety procedures, company policies and lift truck maintenance. Subject matters specific to the worksite, like hazardous conditions or materials, must be covered. Following classroom learning, operators are taught how to safely utilize and operate every type of forklift on the worksite.

Certification through a third-party vendor usually requires an on-site component with hands-on practice.

Usually, a certification provided by an employer will not transfer from the current employer to the next employer. Receiving a lift truck license through employer-provided training enables the operator to operate a forklift for that employer only.

The most important aspect of lift truck license training is forklift safety. The exact safety training requirements differ from one kind of machine to another. Safety problems vary from industry to industry and from employer to employer. Both third-party providers and employer-provided training may have to address extra requirements for safety training in applicable businesses, such as in marine and offshore operations.
